

Notes on Morning Scripture

Genesis 42-44

God's work within this story is preserved in Psalm 105:16-23

42:6 fulfills Genesis 37:7

42:22 Here Reuben, and in chapter 44, Judah--both mentioned in the chapter 37 as the brothers act upon their jealousy of Joseph-- offer more appropriate responses

43:2 It seems as if the families go through their food supply before fulfilling Joseph's orders to return with Benjamin (what did Simeon think of this timeframe?)

44:18 While Joseph was deeply moved at seeing Benjamin, it was Judah's noble humility that ultimately causes Joseph to reveal his identify to his brothers.

Acts 23

Vs 1: Previously mentioned in 23:2, he is the third Ananias in Acts of the Apostles, with the husband of Sapphira, and the man who restored Paul's vision the first two.

Vs 22: The Way, original name for the disciples, predates the term "Christian". See Acts 9:2, 19:9

Editorial: The Gracious and Merciful God

Benjamin, whose name means 'son of my right hand', receives blessing from both his Father and Brother. Jacob calls upon El Shaddai to grant mercy upon Benjamin as he is sent off. Joseph, upon seeing his brother, speaks "God be gracious to you" (43:14, 29). They speak two attributes of God that Israel often called upon throughout her history and music, and through the prophets. We share their reliance upon the grace and mercy of God.

Moses heard from the Lord on Mt. Sinai, describing himself as the gracious and compassionate One (Exodus 34:6).

Nehemiah, leading the people in prayer upon return from Exile, declared; "You are a gracious and merciful God" (9:17, 31)

David sang "Lord, you are a compassionate and gracious God, slow to anger, abounding in love and faithfulness" (Psalm 86:15, 103:8, 145:8)

The prophet Joel beckons the people back to God: Return to the LORD your God, for he is gracious and compassionate (2:13)

Jonah also joins the chorus as he wrestles with the Lord's grace (4:2).

In Scripture, the right hand symbolized the favor of God (whereas the left symbolized judgment). For example, Jesus is exalted to the right hand of the Father. The Son of My Right Hand (Benjamin) hears blessings upon him as he lives within God's story.

Acknowledging the grace and mercy of God is the rewarding way to observe life. It is far better path than to hold onto the guilt we carry. Think about Benjamin's brothers:

"The resulting deception of their father lies at the bottom of everything. The brothers have no room in which to act, no energy for imagination, and no possibility of freedom. They are bound by the power of an unforgiven past, immobilized by guilt and driven by anxiety. Their guilt and anxiety can surface neither in the presence of the father nor in the presence of Joseph...They cannot see themselves as a generation of promise-bearers. They are unable to think of any generation after themselves. They are fated, locked to a past moment. They cannot be open to any new possibility, either as a new gift from God or as afresh work of Joseph." (Brueggemann, Genesis, 338)

Rather, we are invited to follow Christ, full of grace and truth (John 1:14). "Let us then approach God's throne of grace with confidence, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help us in our time of need" (Hebrews 4:16)

Dear Tabby, Raising Life (issues) Acts 9:36

How is the Reformation going?

Dear Martin,

Thanks for asking. At the end of this month, we will observe the 500th anniversary of the lecture that you posted, which sparked the spiritual reforming of continental Europe. The printing press, and increase in exploration allowed the message of righteousness by faith to spread throughout the earth. I'd like to quote from a collection of your writings entitled Day by Day We Magnify Thee.

And if Christ be not raised, your faith is vain, ye are yet in your sins. (I Corinthians 15:17)

If a man desires to preach the Gospel, he must above all else preach that Christ is risen. Whoever does not preach this is no apostle, for it is the main article of our belief, and those are the purest and noblest books which teach most about this. The greatest power lies in this article of our belief, for if there was no Resurrection we should have no comfort or hope, and everything else that Christ has done and suffered would be in vain. Therefore we must teach this: Behold, Christ died for you; He took upon Himself your sin, death and hell, and bore the burden of it all. But nothing could hold Him down. He was too strong. He rose from beneath it all and overcame it and subjected it to Himself, and He did this only that you should be freed from it and made lord over it. If you believe it, it is yours. O, how well we Christians should know this; how clear and distinct should this Epistle be to us!

Earlier in his letter to the Church in Corinth, Paul wrote these words:

God will also keep you firm to the end, so that you will be blameless on the day of our Lord Jesus Christ. God is faithful, who has called you into fellowship with his Son, Jesus Christ our Lord. (1:8-9)
